Dr. Jerry Curry



Dr. Jerry Curry will be the speaker at the October meeting which will be held at Ebenezer Lutheran Church. The meeting will begin at 7:00 p.m. and there will be a "Meet and Greet" gathering with light refreshments in the reception room at 6:30 p.m.

Last year, Ebenezer Lutheran Church was the recipient of a wonderful harpsichord given by Dick and Kathy Coolidge. The instrument was made by German-born harpsichord builder Eric Herz and improved by renowned harpsichord maker Richard Kingston from Fort Mill, South Carolina. Dr. Curry will be using this instrument in his lecture-performance.

In his talk "Deciphering the Code," Dr. Curry will discuss ornamentation in the chorale preludes of J.S. Bach (*Orgelbüchlein*) and in selections from *Mass for the Parishes* by François Couperin. He will also offer insights into the rhythms and tempos for selections from *Messiah*.

Dr. Jerry Curry is well known throughout the southeast as a consummate performer of Baroque music. He is Distinguished Professor Emeritus at the University of South Carolina, where he taught undergraduate and graduate music theory and harpsichord. He holds degrees from the University of Northern Iowa and the University of Iowa. He first played harpsichord under early music specialist Robert Donington and he studied in master classes with the French harpsichordist Kenneth Gilbert. He is the author of the text "Introduction to the Study of Counterpoint." His affiliations include the Society for Music Theory and the Southeastern Historical Keyboard Society. At present, he performs with the Columbia Baroque Soloists.

Congratulations!



Last month's newsletter featured the exciting news about the 2012 winner of the Young Organist Competition, Carolyn Craig. This month we feature the 2011 winner Jacob Reed. Recently Jacob performed **Clavierübung III** in its entirety in Durham NC. In the past year, he has performed Buxtehude's *Te Deum Laudamus*, Prelude and Fugue in e minor ("Wedge") by J.S. Bach, Trio Sonata No. 2 of J.S. Bach, Chorals No. 1 and No. 2 of César Franck, Messiaen's *Dieu parmi Nous* (from *La Nativité du Seigneur*) and *Les deux murailles d'eau* (from *Le Livre du Saint-Sacrement*) and movements from Elgar's organ sonata.

Jacob was offered a prestigious and massive merit scholarship at Eastman School of Music which would afford him the opportunity to study with both David Higgs and Nathan Laube. But he really wanted to attend Yale and study with Thomas Murray. It was an agonizing decision but in the end he chose Yale because it is probably the best match for the combination of his organ, academic, and extracurricular interests, and because he wants to spend time with Thomas Murray in case Professor Murray retires before

Jacob is ready for graduate school. He is excited and happy to be at Yale. Thomas Murray is his organ teacher (Jacob is his only undergraduate student) and he does not even have to cross a street to practice on a Von Beckerath organ and a Holtkamp organ! Jacob is working towards becoming a musicologist on the academic side of things and he has successfully auditioned into the Collegium on both viola da gamba and harpsichord.

The 2014 winner of the Young Organist Competition, Justin DuRant, is now a freshman organ major at USC where he studies with Dr. Jared Johnson. Justin will perform a recital on November 16 at Shandon United Methodist Church.

The Greater Columbia AGO Chapter should feel proud that we have encouraged these young people on a career in organ. Now in its fourth year, the Young Organist Competition will be held on March 8, 2014 at Shandon United Methodist Church. As always, your donations help keep this important venture of AGO going.

Internationally known for his innovative and inspiring hymn festivals and for his creative work with children, **Michael Burkhardt** is in frequent demand as a choral clinician, organ recitalist, and hymn festival leader.

He is currently Director of Worship and the Arts at Holy Cross Lutheran Church, Livonia, Michigan, Director of Worship and the Arts for the Southeast Michigan Synod of the ELCA, and Artistic Director of the Detroit Handbell Ensemble. From 2001-2007 he served on the faculty of Carthage College (ELCA) in Kenosha, WI, as Director of Choral Activities, College Organist, and Artist in Residence. Prior to his appointment at Carthage, he was a Faculty Associate in organ at Arizona State University, Tempe, AZ. In addition, he served Christ College Irvine (LCMS), Irvine, CA, as College Organist and head of studies in church music and music education, as well as Luther Seminary, St. Paul, MN, and Trinity Seminary, Columbus, OH, as Guest Lecturer in their Master of Sacred Music programs.

Dr. Burkhardt is a graduate of Carthage College, Kenosha, WI. He earned his M.M. degree from Southern Methodist University, Dallas, TX, and his D.M.A. degree from Arizona State University, Tempe, AZ.

He has performed and led seminars at both national and regional events for the American Guild of Organists, the Hymn Society, the Association of Lutheran Church Musicians, the Presbyterian Association of Musicians, the Fellowship of United Methodists in Music and Worship Arts, and the American Choral Directors Association. He made his symphonic hall debut in 1999 at the Meyerson Symphony Hall in Dallas, TX, and since 2003 has made four performance-teaching tours to South Korea and Singapore.

Dr. Burkhardt is author of *Part-Singing Global Style*, a resource focusing on sequential part-singing techniques in treble arrangements of global pieces, and author of *Singing with Understanding*, a curriculum utilizing the great hymns, folksongs and spirituals of the Church to share faith stories and to teach the elements of music and worship. He is composer of two settings of the Eucharistic liturgy, *A New Song* and *Missa St. Andrew*, as well as numerous organ improvisations, choral octavos and handbell compositions, available through MorningStar Music Publishers (St. Louis, MO), Choristers Guild (Dallas, TX), and Concordia Publishing House (St. Louis, MO).

I am happy to announce "Bach Festival Days, October 27-30, 2013."

The Sacred Music Program of Lenoir-Rhyne University presents this event to highlight the life and work of Johann Sebastian Bach. Our Church Musicians-in-Residence and Bach experts this year are The Rev. Dr. Mark Bangert, Professor Emeritus of Worship and Church Music at the Lutheran School of Theology at Chicago, and Mr. Kenneth Miller, graduate intern and assistant musician at the Cathedral of St. Philip (Episcopal) in Atlanta, and an alumnus of Lenoir-Rhyne. Dr. Bangert has written many chapters in publications of the International Society for Theological Bach Research and has organized and conducted the annual "Bach for the Sem" LSTC benefit concert for the past 15 years. He is also the Bach Choir Artistic Director and Scholar in Residence at Evangelical Lutheran Church of St. Luke, Chicago. Mr. Kenneth Miller ('10) is a doctoral candidate in the Yale School of Music and Institute of Sacred Music where he gave a recital of the complete Bach Clavier-Übung Part III of 1739. At Yale, he received the Charles Ives Prize for his playing and the Aidan Kavanagh Prize for his academic research on notation in seventeenth-century German keyboard counterpoint. Both presenters will share their expertise on Bach in recital, lectures, discussions, rehearsals, and worship performance. All events will be held in the Mauney Music Building on the university campus and are free and open to the public. February "Master Class with Jack Mitchener"

The South Carolina Chapter of the Fellowship of Methodist Musicians will hold a two-day conference at Shandon United Methodist Church. Dr. Jack Mitchner, Professor of Organ at Mercer University in Macon GA, will present a session on "Creative Hymn Playing" and he will be the organist for the worship service. On Saturday morning, he will conduct a master for USC organ students.

March "Music and Astronomy"

An organist, composer, and astronomer, Dr. Matthew Whitehouse will present a program featuring his compositions and the relationship between music and astronomy. Matthew is a graduate of USC who recently completed his doctorate at the University of Arizona where he studied with Pamela Decker.

"Young Organist Competition"

Also in March, the Young Organist Competition, now in its fourth year, will feature high school organists who will compete for monetary prizes.

May "The Incomparable Wilma Jenson"

Now 85 years old, Wilma Jenson is a legend in the organ world. She will perform a recital on Friday evening and offer a class on Saturday morning.
